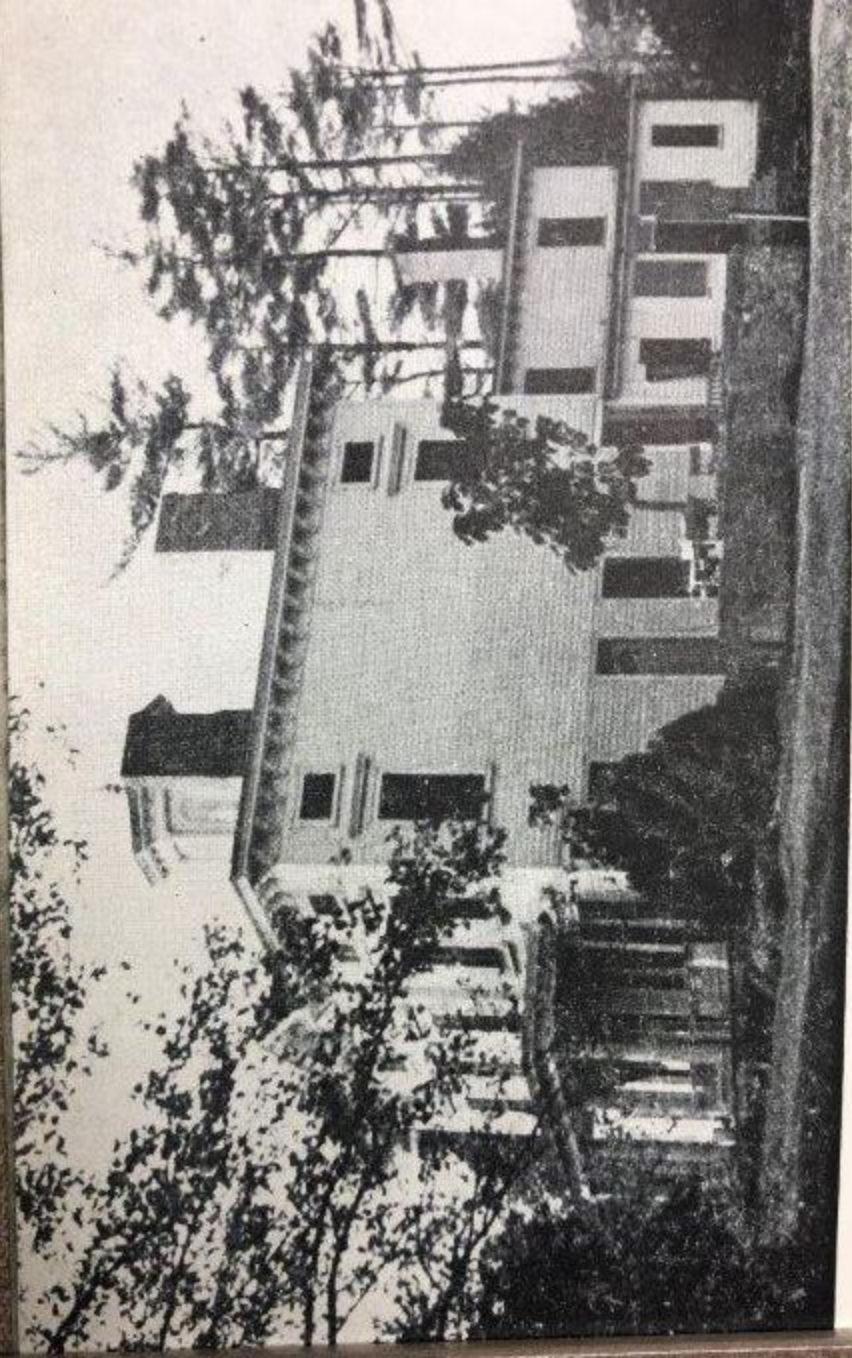

## EVENTS FOR THE YEAR

The program has been arranged to appeal to our hiking, outdoor and social interests. From time to time picnics will be planned at the Lodge when all day activities are scheduled elsewhere. Guests are very welcome at all of our parties and outings.

*September 28, Sunday*—Reunion and Annual Fall Business Meeting at the Lodge. We will continue our celebration of the tenth anniversary of the founding of U. O. C. If you were at the tenth birthday party last May you belong at the Lodge on Sunday because this is an adjourned meeting. If you were not at that party you must come to help finish our celebration. Bring lots of guests too. Come in the morning or afternoon. Hamburger steaks, rolls and coffee will be furnished by the club at 5 P.M. The Helgi Johnsons who were our hosts this time last year will greet us again and make us feel at home.

*October 19, Sunday*—Tenth Anniversary Hike in the Wyanokie Plateau. It is fitting that we should be on the trail ten years after U. O. C. was permanently organized October 19, 1931. We will meet at Ford Hall at 8 A. M. Hike Leader William Rieman III will lead the way in his car to Haskell, N. J., where we will meet at the railroad station at approximately 9:30 A. M. The hike will take us from Haskell over Carris Hill, Wyanokie High Point, Pine Paddies, Wolf's Den, and Manaticut. We will return over the same trail making a total round trip distance of 12 miles through moderately rugged country with beautiful views of Wanaque Reservoir. We will arrive back in New Brunswick at approximately 7 P. M. If you do not care to walk the whole distance, the hike to Wyanokie High Point and back, a round trip distance of approximately 5 miles, is well worth the extra effort to arise early this Sunday morning.

*October 26, Sunday*—Bass River State Forest Outing. This is a new type of outing for U. O. C. in new territory and we are grateful to Thurlow Nelson for arranging and leading this expedition into South Jersey. We shall leave Ford Hall at 8 A. M. for a two hour drive of 78 miles. Follow route 4 and 9 in the direction of Atlantic City to New Gretna where at the overhead blinker a road, marked Chatsworth, Pemberton and Mount Holly turns to the right. Follow this road to the fork, taking right hand road to C.C.C. Camp. Turn left at the camp and follow U. O. C. signs to the beach on the new lake in the Bass River State Forest. Dinner consisting of oysters, clams, and coffee, all properly prepared will be served at 1 P. M. on the beach of the lake. Bring anything else you may think you will need to fill the interstices. There will be short hikes through the beautiful State Forest and if it is warm enough there will be a chance to swim in the lake, so wear appropriate clothes and bring your swim suit. We are going to have a grand time.

*November 2, Sunday*—At Home in the Lodge—The Herbert Metzgers, as hosts, request your presence at the Second Annual U. O. C. exterior and interior decorator's party at the Lodge. Come morning or afternoon with smocks and old clothes. Remember the fun we had last year decorating the kitchen and ourselves? Some of the same and even better awaits you this year and we know that you will not miss this party for anything. If you were not present last year you have a treat in store for you. There will be steaks and coffee furnished by the club at 5 P. M.

*November 16, Sunday*—Treasure Hunt on Island Beach near Seaside Park. Remember the hike last January along the unspoiled sands of Island Beach, the spin drift of the pounding sea; the old wrecks, at least one of which was a pirate ship? An old map of this region has been found which we believe will lead to buried treasure and Earle Perkins has promised to lead an expedition to hunt for it. All U. O. C. members and guests have been appointed to this expedition and should report at Ford Hall by 10 A. M. on this Sunday morning. Take route S 28 to Old Bridge. At the circle there, follow sign to Englishtown, Tennent, Freehold by-pass to U. S. 9, through Lakewood to junction of N. J. 37 before reaching Toms River. Turn left to Seaside Heights, then right to Seaside Park. Proceed south along the only road between the ocean and Barnegat Bay to the Gate House where we will meet at 11:30 A. M. Distance about 55 miles. Take camera, binoculars, sand-tight shoes, lunch, your own vacuum bottle of hot drink, and knapsack to carry lunch to and treasure back from the beach. We will all lunch together around a drift-wood fire and return to cars at 5 P. M.

*December 20, Saturday*—The U. O. C. Christmas parties are always big successes and this will be no exception for many reasons, some of which you must come to the Party to appreciate. A decorated Lodge, a beautiful Christmas tree will greet you at 2 P. M.; at 4 P. M. we will enjoy the Yule log ceremonies and then the turkey and fixings at 5 P. M. (Cost pro-rated). About 6 P. M. Santa Claus should arrive to distribute his pack full of gifts. To be certain that the pack is a full one, everyone should bring a ten cent gift for the Lodge or for the children. *January or February*—Skating Party. When the ice is just right you will receive a telephone call, inviting you to a skating party and steak fry. Hosts: The Helgi Johnsons.

Russell to report the rabbit's whereabouts at 1:30 P.M. at Ford Hall so come one, come all in your cars to rush to the trail of this erratic animal as he leaps through local territory. 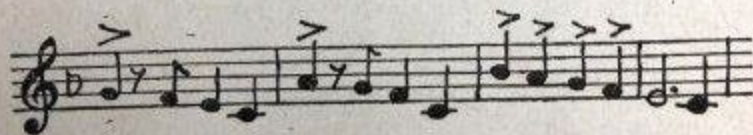

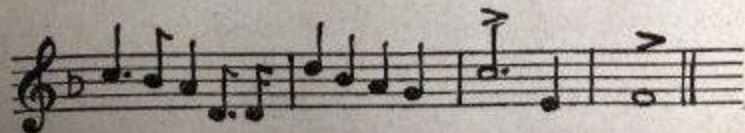
